Alumnus and Nypro CEO Steve Borges '90 educates students

Nypro Healthcare Executive Vice President and CEO Steve Borges '90 recently spent a day on campus as "executive in residence," sharing his insights and philosophy with students and faculty.

In addition to meetings with senior staff and Business Administration Department faculty, Borges was guest instructor in two undergraduate classes.

"I'm not big into entitlement, and I'm passionate about education," Borges told the students. "Nothing is given to you. You've got to work for it, and Fitchburg State gives you the tools to do that."

Borges encouraged students to pursue internship opportunities, noting he revamped Nypro's own internship program once he joined the team.

He also discussed the importance of creating a corporate culture that empowers employees to share their insights.

"I want to create the culture that's good for my business," he said. "I have 15,000 employees around the world. Every single day they're relying on me to make the right decisions. I want them to challenge me, because I don't always have all the right answers.


The Fitchburg State

The talk is sponsored by the Black Student Union.




Community Read continues with "Strangelove" screening

On the Conlon Hall Media Wall-Pinhole Photography: Between Chance & Intention

The photography of Associate Professor Donald Tarallo (Communications Media) is on display at the Conlon Hall Media Wall. The artist will present a wall talk for "Pinhole Photography: Between Chance & Intention" today at 3:30 p.m., followed by a reception.

"When I was 7 years old I got my first camera," said Tarallo, who teaches graphic design. "It was a green and silver Kodak Hawkeye Instamatic X (not near as instant as our cameras today). Every week I would spend my entire allowance on film and developing. I had to mail the film away to Ohio and wait one week to get my prints back. The span of time between these two moments was full of great anticipation as I never quite knew what I would get back. That unpredictability of photography stayed with me."

Later he began to experiment with homemade pinhole film cameras. "The element of chance that pinhole cameras introduced was very exciting to me for the same reasons I enjoyed my first camera as a child. Beyond that I enjoy the way pinhole images encapsulate a moment slowly and less decisively-offering a space for imagination and poetic dimensions to unfold with the viewer. These image span 20 years and cover themes of boundaries, self and nature, Worcester diner cars, landscapes, and spirituality."

The exhibit will be featured until March 9.
