

### Celebrating Women's History Month


The campus community will celebrate Women's History Month in March with a <u>series</u> of programs on the theme "Her Story, Our Stories."

#### Harrod Lecture tomorrow features Elise Takehana

Associate Professor Elise Takehana (English Studies) will present her Harrod Lecture "Database & Algorithm as Literary Infrastructure" at 3:30 p.m. tomorrow in Presidents' Hall.

During this lecture, Dr. Takehana will discuss the conflicts and overlaps between storytelling and data analysis by exploring examples in experimental literature, interactive fiction, portraiture, and quantitative approaches to studying language and literature. The talk offers several reflections on the nature of human expression in the age of big data and how that might color what we think of as "human."

### Community Read film screening Thursday features "District 9"

As part of the <u>Community Read</u> of Trevor Noah's memoir *Born a Crime*, there will be a screening of the acclaimed 2009 film "District 9" at **6 p.m. Thursday** in Ellis White Lecture Hall in Hammond Hall.

The film, directed by Neill Blomkamp, is a science-fiction adventure set in South Africa that explores themes of apartheid and discrimination that are also central to Noah's memoir. The screening will be followed by a discussion moderated by **Associate Professor Kevin McCarthy** (Communications Media).

Save the Date: Artrageous coming in April


