Welcome Back

The campus welcomed new and returning students last week for the start of its 130th academic year.

Approximately 800 new first-year and undergraduate transfer students joined the university community last week, includes students from 24 states, 20 countries and five continents. Our student-athletes were on hand to help welcome our new Falcons (see photos on the [Burg Blog](#)).



Several new academic programs are launching this fall, including an interdisciplinary minor in [political journalism](#), serving students interested in journalism, political science, and the role of reporting in democratic societies. This semester also marks the debut of a new course called “Podcasting the Past,” in which students will collaborate across the disciplines of history and communications to integrate historical research and story development with audio production. Their work will be released through [Perseverantia, the Fitchburg State Podcast Network](#).

Among the early-semester highlights:

- Rock the Block, our annual clubs and organizations fair, will be held at **3:30 p.m. Tuesday** on the Quad and along Highland Avenue. The event is celebrating its 25th year.
- The university's observance of [Latinx/a/o Heritage Month](#) begins at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday a live mariachi band and free food on the Quad. Learn more about the month's events on the university website.
- The 6th Recruit Officer Course of our police program will hold its graduation ceremony at **11 a.m. Friday, Sept. 15** in Weston Auditorium.
- The university will celebrate Latinx/a/o Heritage Month from mid-September to mid-October. Additional details will be posted online.

Center for Italian Culture series explores immigration to and from Italy



IT offers new login portal to minimize sign-ins

This semester, Information Technology launches its new Single-Sign-On (SSO) login portal at login.fitchburgstate.edu. The portal lists configured applications to which faculty, staff and students may log in with their Fitchburg state email address and password (also referred to as your Falcon Key). Today it's a one-stop shop for accessing Blackboard, Gmail, College Scheduler, FalConnect, OneCard eAccounts, Rave Alert, and more. As time goes on, more applications will be transitioned from links to integrated SSO applications. No more need to remember multiple website addresses and bookmarks.

The security of campus accounts remains a priority. As part of the portal rollout, IT is moving away from Google Two-Step and Duo to Microsoft Multi-Factor Authentication (MFA). Come February, MFA will be required when signing into the portal and all related applications, including Blackboard. To set up Microsoft MFA, sign into <https://aka.ms/mfasetup> and follow the prompts.

Please note, IT will be turning the Google Two-Step requirement off in the coming months as part of this transition and post instructions to walk campus users through the unenrollment process.
