NCLEX passing rate soars

The <u>Nursing Department</u> announced that 98% of its May 2023 nursing graduates passed the <u>NCLEX</u> licensure examination on their first try last summer and fall.

Fitchburg State's nursing graduates have long boasted high pass rates for the licensure examination, with 95% and higher passing for several consecutive years. The numbers dipped slightly after COVID, said Associate Professor Debbie



Benes, chair of the Nursing Department, though still represented the vast majority of graduates. Still, the decline prompted quick intervention by the department.

"We were aware that the testing model was being changed to better measure clinical judgment and decision-making," Benes said. "We started preparing our students for that change in their junior year by introducing them to the new types of questions, and changing up the way they were learning in the classroom and simulation center. Students started to do a lot more active and engaged learning, and faculty transitioned over to that type of pedagogy."

University part of pilot program rethinking LSAT

As the longtime advisor to its <u>pre-law program</u>, **Professor Paul Weizer** has seen many former students go on to successful careers in the law. He has also seen otherwise successful students struggle with the standardized test that can qualify them for law school.

This year, Weizer led the effort for Fitchburg State to join a pilot program of five institutions nationwide to try an

alternative to the Law School Admission Test, better known as the LSAT.

Fitchburg State is launching its pilot of <u>LawReady</u> this semester, in collaboration with the Law School Admission Council. The program is designed to meet students earlier in their undergraduate studies, providing a roadmap to law school readiness with academic skills development aligned with courses already taking place on campus, resources to assist navigating the pre-law process, and community support along the students' journey to a

legal education.
