#### University recognized for social mobility in U.S. News rankings

For the second consecutive year, Fitchburg State has been recognized for upward social mobility in U.S. News & World Report's annual ranking of colleges and universities.

The ranking among regional universities reflects Fitchburg State's success in enrolling and graduating large numbers of economically disadvantaged students.

"Access and affordability are at the very foundation of our mission," President Lapidus said. "We are proud of our track record of creating opportunities for all students, and for helping them complete their studies and move forward with their lives and careers."

The methodology looked at students who qualified for Pell Grants, who typically come from households whose family incomes are less than \$50,000 annually, though most Pell Grant money goes to students with a total family income below \$20,000.

### Unity Rally carries powerful message

Members of the campus community gathered – six feet apart and wearing face coverings – for a Unity Rally in support of Black Lives Matter on Sept. 22.

The program featured voices from the student body and administration, and included a shared commitment to fostering a safe and equitable university.

The event was organized by Muhammad "Moose" Mahmood (pictured at left), a junior and member of the Falcons football team. He recounted experiences he had with police officers and wondered if their outcome would have been worse if he was Black.

"Our Black community is in danger," he said. "This isn't breaking news, but it should be breaking hearts."

#### President hosting open forum for staff on Tuesday, Oct. 13



#### **Faculty Notes**

Professor Edward Martens (Industrial Technology) was awarded emeriti status this fall.

Martens earned his bachelor's degree, master's degree, and PhD in physics from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He joined the faculty at Fitchburg State College in 1971 after a faculty appointment at Northeastern University and a career as a senior scientist at American Science & Engineering.

Professor Martens was a pioneer for gender equity in STEM education, establishing the University's first technology course that honored the contributions of women in science and technology. Martens was also responsible for developing the first courses in automated manufacturing, digital electronics, engineering experimentation, and microprocessor-based control systems.

He was an active member of the campus and the profession. He served as a member of the National Association of Industrial Technology, the American Physical Society, and the American Society of Engineering Education. On campus, Martens was a leader on the All College Curriculum Committee, the Academic Policies Committee, and the University-wide Promotions Committee. He retired from Fitchburg State in 2008.

**Professor Adem Elveren** (Economics, History and Political Science) was recently published in <u>Taylor & Francis Online</u> with an article entitled "Informality, Inequality and Profit Rate."
