Students will consult with academic advisor about field choices. The advisor will file curriculum with Registrar.

Option 1: TWO FIELDS - Consists in a university approved minor, plus a field of six courses in one discipline, with 50% of the field courses at the 2000 level or above.

OR Option 2: THREE FIELDS (see seperate four-year plan of study) - Consists in a university approved minor, plus two fields of four courses, each field having one discipline, with 50% of each field's courses at the 2000 level or above.

Global Diversity Area

Two courses taken must meet the Global Diversity requirement: GDAN course + (GDC or GDCN course) OR GDCN course + (GDA or GDAN course). These courses are allowed to satisfy this requirement and another requirement at the same time.
