## Application fees waived for undergraduate admissions



Fitchburg State will no longer charge the \$50 application fee for its undergraduate Admissions during spring, summer, and fall 2021.


"The elimination of the fee removes a financial barrier to students applying to college and is part of our institutional equity initiatives," said President Richard S. Lapidus. "This fee elimination builds on the university's work to increase access and improve retention, efforts that have led us to be ranked nationally by U.S. News and World Report for social mobility."

"Fitchburg State University is committed to making higher education affordable, and that

starts with eliminating financial barriers that may keep a student from even applying to college," said Provost/Vice President for Academic Affairs Alberto J.F. Cardelle.

## **Grant will support Early College scholarships**


Students who have completed an Early College program at Fitchburg State will be eligible for scholarship support in completing their degrees thanks to a grant from the Community Foundation of North Central Massachusetts.

The \$28,000 grant will fund scholarships that are renewable for four years at



Fitchburg State. Six Early College students, now enrolled at Fitchburg State as first-year students, will be receiving the scholarship support this year. To be eligible for the scholarship, they must have completed at least 12 credits while in the Early College program.

In November 1941, a film crew came to the city of Fitchburg to capture local faces and places for a "slice of life" film designed to be shown in local cinemas.

The footage went unseen for years but has now been digitized and is in the midst of a meticulous restoration under the auspices of **Professor Charles Roberts** (Communications Media).


### CenterStage and cultural events

The Communications Media Department's fall theatrical presentation, a series of recorded monologues called "Our Reckoning," goes live today.

The show's individual pieces, which are mostly student-written and student-performed, aim to focus on issues surrounding the Black Lives Matter movement, PTSD, struggles with academia with ADHD, our current coronavirus pandemic, mental illness, among other important issues.

Director and **Professor Mary Vreeland** says about the show that it is about the notion that we have to come to a collective or personal reckoning with these important issues. The compounding stress of them weighs heavy on us, so the production is aimed to enlighten audience members on the issues and give them the strength to for

the issues and give them the strength to face them.



While the show was meant to be performed for an in-person audience, for safety reasons the decision was made to record, edit, and post the video of the performances and post them online for a broader audience to view.
