## **University certified as Military Friendly**


Fitchburg State University announced today that it has earned the 2021-2022 Military Friendly® School designation.

## Undergraduate tuition and fees frozen for 2021-22 academic year

Fitchburg State will freeze undergraduate tuition and fees for the 2021-22 academic year, President Lapidus announced this month.

"Access and affordability are central to Fitchburg State's mission," Lapidus said. "Our commitment to keeping costs flat reflects that dedication to keeping higher education within reach for students and families, especially at a time when so many have been hard-hit by the COVID-19 pandemic."



Fitchburg State has long employed strategies to limit fee increases, and it remains among the most affordable universities in Massachusetts' public higher education system.


## **Expanding Our Stories is theme of talk Wednesday**

The program, sponsored by the Amelia V. Gallucci-Cirio Library at the university, will be virtual.


To Kill a Mockingbird – both Harper Lee's novel and the acclaimed film adaptation – remains one of the stories through which Americans most frequently engage with issues of race, community, and history, in our classrooms and our collective conversations alike.

In this talk, Railton will use Gordon Parks' 1963 autobiographical novel and 1969 film adaptation <u>The Learning Tree</u> to make the case for expanding the stories and voices we read, view, and remember.


