
## Women's History Month observances begin this week

The university will celebrate Women's History Month in March with a series of programs and talks including a keynote lecture focusing on the economic case for LGBT equality.

The university's observances begin with International Women's Day at 12:30 p.m. Thursday, in Hammond Hall main lounge. The event will include a "herstory" discussion circle with international students from Albania, Cameroon, Germany, India, Kenya, Morocco, and Nigeria, facilitated by students from Professor Viera Lorencova's intercultural communication class.

The program is organized by the university's Communications Media Department, the Office of International Education, and the Women, Gender and Sexuality Studies program.

The forum will provide an update on the progress of the plan, as well as an opportunity to engage in conversation about the strategies and ideas that will propel Fitchburg State toward achievement of its goals. The discussion will also look at how the university's plans goals will advance the Commonwealth's top statewide priority for higher education: closing "the achievement gap" by significantly raising the enrollment, attainment and long-term success outcomes among under-represented student populations.

Themed committees have submitted reports to the Strategic Planning Steering Committee and their work can be viewed <u>online</u>.


## **Center for Faculty Scholarship events this week**

The Center for Faculty Scholarship is hosting two events this week.

Professor J.J. Sylvia IV (Communications Media) will discuss "Becoming Data: A Digital Humanities Project" as part of the university's Speakers Series **today at 12:30 p.m.** in the Center for Teaching and Learning in the Amelia V. Gallucci-Cirio Library. Refreshments will be served.

Dr. Moya Bailey, a digital humanist and race, gender, and disability studies scholar at Northeastern University, will deliver a lecture at 3:30 p.m. Wednesday in the Randall Science Lecture Hall in the Antonucci Science Complex. A reception will follow.

The talk will look at the impact of mineral harvesting on the Black Congolese youth who do this work and what digital disability activism in the West can do.



## "Twisted Intimacy" symposium delved into Cormier archives

Members of the English Studies Department organized and presented the Robert E. Cormier Symposium "Twisted Intimacy" last week in Hammond Hall. The program featured a keynote address by graphic novelist Jarrett Krosoczka.

## Intersection of police and race explored at panel talk

As part of Black History Month, the Black Student Union sponsored a candid conversation about the relationship between police officers and the Black community last week in Hammond Hall.

Panelists included Police Academy Director Lisa Lane McCarty, University Police Lt. Robert Gilman, and Lorenzo Boyd, director of the Center for Advanced Policing at the University of New Haven.

In a discussion moderated by Student Trustee Crystal Aneke, the panelists discussed the importance of police officers' knowing their communities, and community members' getting to know their police officers. A recurring theme of the discussion was the importance of education and recruitment.

Maus is the story of Vladek Spiegelman, a Jewish survivor of the Holocaust and his son, a cartoonist, who tries to come to terms with his father, his father's terrifying story, and history itself.



## Reminder: CPS course on needs of LGBTQIA students

The Center for Professional Studies is



offering a new hybrid course this spring for educators and school staff on supporting LGBTQIA and gender-diverse students in K-12 environments.

The <u>course</u>, which carries one graduate credit or 15 Department of Elementary and Secondary Education-approved professional development points, will run April 4 to May 9.

The course, taught by Center for Professional Studies Assistant Director Dani Langdon, is an introduction into the challenges that Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Intersex, Asexual (LGBTQIA+) students face in schools on



a daily basis. By understanding terminology, historical context, and preconceived notions the LGBTQIA+ community, educators can begin to creating intentional, inclusive, and supportive learning environments.

The course will explore myths and perceptions, the prevalence and effects of bullying, unintended bias in schools and classrooms, and the laws and policies in place that affect LGBTQIA+ students. This course will give educators the tools to start developing a more inclusive curriculum, navigate conversations around gender and sexual orientation, and foster a respectful and engaging environment where all students can thrive.


