University partnering in efforts to "activate" Mill Street

MassDevelopment and the civic crowdfunding platform Patronicity have launched a new Commonwealth Places campaign with the Fitchburg State University Foundation and Reimagine North of Main to activate Mill Street, a remote alleyway in downtown Fitchburg. The organizations will transform the concrete road into a unique, temporary park using low-cost, flexible design solutions like movable astroturf, planters, and modular decking, which can serve as seating or a music venue. The park will feature murals and other works of public art, and decorative window treatments will be placed on nearby buildings. Organizers will also make available a street cart where



vendors can sell their food and goods, enabling entrepreneurs to take advantage of increased foot traffic.

New agreements will support nursing objectives

Newly-signed agreements between Bristol Community College, Middlesex Community College, Mount Wachusett Community College and Quinsigamond Community College will guarantee students' seamless admission to Fitchburg State's baccalaureate nursing programs.

The collaborations will help the state meet the Massachusetts Action Coalition goal of having 66 percent of the state's nurses hold a B.S. in Nursing degree by 2020, and 80 percent by 2025.



These agreements are designed to help students achieve their academic and professional goals while supporting the state's public health objectives.

Pact will lead to exercise and sports science degrees

Students graduating from Mount Wachusett Community College's physical therapy assistance program will now be able to bring 75 credits to Fitchburg State University's baccalaureate level Exercise and Sports Science programs.

Qualifying MWCC graduates will be able to transfer to the <u>clinical</u> <u>exercise physiology</u> or <u>strength</u> <u>and conditioning</u> majors.

The agreement signifies the ongoing commitment between



these two institutions of higher education to promote coordinated curricula of the highest quality.

Haskins Mathematics contests draws hundreds

Three hundred students from 13 area high schools recently visited the Fitchburg State University campus to take part in the 39th annual Elizabeth Haskins mathematics competition.

Students tested their skills in a challenging exam and attended sessions exploring different facets of the

discipline with university faculty and students.

Here are two sample problems from the contest:

How many ways can the letters in "mathematics" be rearranged to a unique word (sequence of letters)?

1. 11! (b) 8! (c) 11!/8 (d) 11!/8! (e) 8!/8

The correct answer is (c); the symbol 8! means 8 times 7 times 6 times 5 times 4 times 3 times 2 times 1.

Here is another sample problem: How many ordered pairs of positive integers satisfy the equation 20 x + 19 y = 2019?

(a) 2 (b) 4 (c) 6 (d) 8 (e) 10

The correct answer is (c).

This is the third of four new plays written by Fitchburg State alumni that will be presented this spring. A staged reading is a presentation of a play in which actors read from a script, but have rehearsed the scenes to help the audience imagine what the play would look like in a full production. This series of staged readings will be presented by <u>The Forge Theater Lab</u>, founded by Fitchburg State Professor Kelly Morgan and several university alumni with a mission to develop new works. This is the story of the magazine's editor, Harriet Farley, and a labor activist, Sarah Bagley, and the rise and fall of their friendship, the magazine, and Lowell's "Mill Girl" culture.

Housing units available for upcoming academic year

Three units at the university-owned faculty/staff housing at 132 Highland Ave. will be available for rent starting this summer. These apartments are within walking distance of campus (two blocks) making it possible to engage in the entire spectrum of academic and co-curricular activities that occur here at Fitchburg State.















All units are recently renovated and include full kitchen with stainless steel appliances, laundry area with washer and dryer, separate living and dining areas, and one off-street parking space. The apartments are unfurnished.

- Unit 1 one-floor unit on the first floor with two bedrooms and one bathroom. \$1,200/month, available beginning of August.
- Unit 3 two-floor unit with two bedrooms and two bathrooms. \$1,300/month, available end of August/beginning of September.
- Unit 4 two-floor unit with two bedrooms and two and a half bathrooms. \$1,300/month, available beginning in July.

The monthly rent includes water/sewer and city trash collection. Tenant is responsible for heating/cooling, electricity and hot water.
