# Lt. Gov. Polito presents grant funds for ideaLab programming

Lt. Gov. Karyn Polito visited the ideaLab in the Theater Block last week to announce \$500,000 in Urban Agenda Grant awards, including \$60,000 to support ideaLab programming.

"When we empower local leaders and projects that thoughtfully address the unique issues facing our urban centers, we have an outsized impact on the lives of residents," Lt. Gov. Polito said. "The Urban Agenda Grant Program relies on the strong partnerships between local government, non-profits and the business community that are critical to fostering economic success and building stronger neighborhoods in every region in Massachusetts."

"We are grateful for the Baker-Polito Administration's support of the ideaLab, where we hope to

continue linking the university's facilities and faculty and student expertise to the community's needs," said President Lapidus. "This project embodies the collaborative spirit that will help renew downtown Fitchburg and supports the continued growth of its creative economy."

Congresswoman Lori Trahan, elected last November to represent the 3rd District, also recently toured downtown Fitchburg to speak with President Lapidus about the Theater Block project and to learn about other revitalization projects now under way in the community. The tour, which was covered in in the <u>Telegram & Gazette</u> and the <u>Sentinel & Enterprise</u>, included the ideaLab and game design studio space, as well as the artist community being developed in the former B.F. Brown School.

The ideaLab and game design studio are located on the second floor of the theater block at 717 Main St. Students will be using the space this semester for the first time.



#### Moot Court teams continue tradition of success

Fitchburg State continued its streak of strong showings at the American Moot Court Association national championship this month, with a team finishing in the top 10 percent of teams in North America.

Riley Grinkis '18 of Gardner and Matthew Murphy '20 of Milton made it to the second day of oral arguments in the national competition, and also finished second overall in the brief writing contest. Fitchburg State students Kajahna Matos '20 of Lawrence and Theresa Klobucher '20

of Lowell finished 10th in the brief writing competition.

Grinkis graduated from Fitchburg State in December and is headed to Northeastern University Law School on a full scholarship. Matos and Klobucher will enroll this fall at UMass Law School through our partnership whose graduates will complete bachelor's and law degrees in six years.

#### Hockey games to raise funds for ALS research


The Fitchburg State Falcons will take the ice against Plymouth State for the Glenn Roberts Memorial Hockey Game at 5 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 2 to raise funds for the ALS Association Massachusetts Chapter and the Glenn Roberts Memorial Scholarship at Fitchburg High School. The game will be played at the Wallace Civic Center, 1000 John Fitch Highway.

Glenn Roberts died in 2013 at age 49 after a brave fight against ALS, also known as Lou Gehrig's Disease. Roberts, who worked at Mount Wachusett Community College for more than 20 years, completed a master's degree in counseling psychology at Fitchburg State in 1992. His wife, Debra Roberts, is a triple Falcon, completing degrees at Fitchburg State in 1990, 1994 and 2003.

Tickets for the game are \$10 and will grant admission to the

Fitchburg State and Plymouth State game at 5 p.m. as well as the Fitchburg High School versus Lunenburg High School game at 7:30 p.m. Tickets may be purchased in advance by contacting David Bodah at 781-255-8884. 
#### Faculty talks in library

A classically trained electronic musician and pitched percussionist, Wirasnik designs sound for storytellers and interactive media makers. In his work he explores his




