## Mary Pat Couig '79 selected as commencement speaker

Mary Pat Couig, PhD, MPH, RN, FAAN, a 1979 graduate of Fitchburg State University, will deliver the address at the institution's undergraduate commencement ceremony on **Saturday, May 20** on the main quadrangle. The ceremony is part of the university's 121st commencement exercises.

Couig serves as program manager in the Office of Nursing Services at the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, with responsibilities for Emergency Management and the Registered Nurse Transition-to-Practice Program. In that role, she advises the Veterans Health Administration Chief Nurse Officer on public health emergency preparedness issues and represents the Chief Nurse Officer and Office of Nursing Services on a national level on public health emergency preparedness committees and initiatives. These initiatives support VA's national mission to ensure preparedness to provide services and protect people and in time of crises.

"Dr. Couig is a dedicated public servant who has spent a career improving the health of our communities," said President Lapidus. "Her long record of personal accomplishment will no doubt resonate with our graduates and their families, and we are honored she will share her story with the Class of 2017."

Couig was previously recognized by Fitchburg State with its distinguished alumna award in 2003.

Couig manages and provides oversight for the national RN Transition-to-Practice Program. This year-long program helps new registered nurses transition into their professional roles. She also works collaboratively with Veterans Health Administration program officers and nurse executives to address complex national healthcare delivery and nursing practice issues.

She completed an active duty career in the U.S. Public Health Service as an assistant surgeon general (rear admiral) and the Chief Professional Officer for the Nurse Category. As a senior health care executive she developed policy and provided leadership to the service's Commissioned Corps and Civil Service nurses. She worked closely with the Office of the Surgeon General and senior leadership in the Department of Health and Human Services in the development and

implementation of national and global public health initiatives.

Couig received her associate's degree in nursing from Berkshire Community College in Pittsfield before completing her Bachelor of Science in Nursing at Fitchburg State. She then received a master's degree in public health from the Johns Hopkins School of Hygiene and Public Health in Baltimore and her PhD from the Graduate School of Nursing, Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences in Bethesda, Md.

She and her husband, Dr. Merton V. Smith II, live in Maryland and have two children.

Additional honorees for Fitchburg State's upcoming commencement ceremonies will be announced soon. The university will hold its graduate commencement ceremony at 6:30 p.m. **Thursday, May 18** at its Athletics and Recreation Center, 130 North St.

### Research conference, honors convocation this week

The university is suspending its day classes **Thursday**, **April 20** to allow the entire campus community to participate in a daylong celebration of student accomplishment. The Undergraduate Conference on Research and Creative Practice will be held from 8 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. in Hammond Hall, followed by the 40th annual Honors Convocation at 2 p.m. in Weston Auditorium.

The research conference, sponsored by the university's Office of Academic Affairs and its Student Government Association, consists of presentations by Fitchburg State students from all departments to promote both creativity and scholarship. Faculty members sponsor and judge the student submissions to the conference, now in its eighth year.

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## Criminal Justice concentration gets formal launch

Leaders from Fitchburg State and the state Municipal Police Training Committee signed an agreement this month codifying the university's "4+1" criminal justice program that will result in candidates earning bachelor's and master's degrees, and full police certification, in five years.

The first cohort of students to complete the bachelor's program will graduate next month and

begin their master's studies this summer. By next year, they will be "street ready" to work in any municipal police department in Massachusetts.

President Lapidus and MPTC Executive Director Daniel Zivkovich signed a memorandum of agreement on April 4 formalizing the program that launched two years ago. The criminal justice police concentration now has 96 students, from the first cohort completing their undergraduate degrees next month to 68 first-year students.

"This program provides a set of skills that are not afforded to many other students interested in the policing world," Lapidus said. "We're not cutting any corners here. We're just adding tools to the toolbox."


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## Comm Media Lecture Series wraps up year on April 18


The lecture series is curated by Associate Professor Stephen Goldstein of the Communication Media Department and supported by the university's Ruth Butler Grant.

As part of the Center for Italian Culture's "Romance, Italian Style in New York" film series, the university will screen the Academy Award-winning romantic comedy "Moonstruck" on Wednesday, April 19. The film tells the story of a young widow played by Cher, living with her family in a Brooklyn brownstone, as she contemplates marriage to traditional neighbor Danny Aiello but intrigued by his opera-loving brother, Nicholas Cage. The film explores the romantic problems of multiple generations of her Italian-American family. The soundtrack features everything from Italian-American music to a Puccini opera. Nominated for six Academy Awards.



## Earth Day observances include talks and presentations

Fitchburg State will observe Earth Day with a series of events and discussions supported by its <a href="Sustainability Advisory">Sustainability Advisory</a> Committee.

The observations begin with a panel talk at 4 p.m. Wednesday, April 19 at the Falcon Hub in Hammond Hall sponsored by MASSPIRG, State Sen, Jamie Eldridge (D-Acton) and a panel of faculty members including Chris Picone (Biology & Chemistry) and Liz Gordon (Earth and Geographic Sciences) as well as student activist Tallie Foster will discuss climate change. Topics will include the science, effects, policies and individual actions related to human-caused climate change.

A dozen students will be presenting on the topic during the Undergraduate Conference on Research and Creative Practice Thursday, April 20. The sustainability-themed research projects will be highlighted at a poster session entitled

## Webinar April 25 focuses on master's in middle school ed

The Office of <u>Graduate and</u> <u>Continuing Education</u> will present a free webinar **Tuesday, April 25** for visitors to learn more about its new initial licensure programs leading to the Master of Education in

Middle School Education, launching in the fall of 2017.

Assistant Professor William G. Cortezia, graduate chair of early childhood, elementary and middle school education programs at Fitchburg State, will lead the 30-minute webinar along with Interim Dean of Graduate and Continuing Education Brian P. Bercier, GCE Advising Services and Support Coordinator Marylyn

Participants will learn about curriculum, admissions, application requirements and more and will be eligible to have their admission application fee waived.

The webinar will be offered at 5 p.m. Tuesday, April 25.

Fitchburg State's new Middle School M.Ed. will offer four initial licensure concentrations: English, history, mathematics and general science. It will be available as an online hybrid, low-residency format, and the MAT or GRE tests are not required for admission.

"The new middle school program will provide the candidate with a better understanding of what the needs are for the pre-adolescent in their academic and social development, as well as the individualized concentration," Cortezia said.



The concert band, directed by Michael La Cava, will be playing a mix of new band music, as well as traditional favorites, including the classic "Toccata for





Band" and a new work by the composer Robert W. Smith called "Yellow." The band will also play a classic medley from the movie "Aladdin." The guitar ensemble coached by Paul Luria will be playing classical pieces and holiday tunes arranged for guitars.

The jazz band, led by Professor Michele Caniato, will be playing swing era, hard bop, Latin jazz


tunes, including an arrangement of Oliver Nelson's "Stolen Moments" and a rendition of Herbie Hancock's Chameleon.

The university's vocal talent will be on display when Fitchburg State's choral ensembles present their annual spring concert at 7 p.m. **Monday, May 8** at Weston Auditorium, 353 North St. Admission is free and open to the public. Selected works from American composers from the 18th century to today will be performed at the concert, entitled "Sea to Shining Sea: Choral Music of a Diverse America." The show will span genres from pop to spirituals, classical to jazz, and Broadway hits. The university's concert choir and chamber choir will perform under the direction of Jonathan Harvey.

"This concert is a showcase of the many diverse kinds of music within our country, and our goal is to draw attention to how different and beautiful it all is," Harvey said. "We're performing music by living composers, women composers, black composers, all with an American perspective, but each with their own different perspective on America. We've tried to incorporate as many different kinds of music as possible: classical, Romantic, contemporary, spirituals, musical theater, jazz, pop, and music in between."
