New vice president and deans appointed

President Lapidus announced the appointment of Laura A. Bayless as the university's new vice president for student affairs, effective July 2017. The university also appointed new deans for its Divisions of Arts and Sciences, Health and Natural Sciences, and Graduate and Continuing Education.

The vice president for student affairs role is new, while the dean positions were filled by existing staff and faculty on an interim

basis. Comprehensive national searches for the leadership positions included



representation from all campus constituencies and robust feedback from a series of open forums with the finalists.

- **John C. Schaumloffel**, currently professor in the Department of Chemistry & Biochemistry at SUNY College at Oneonta, will become the dean of health and natural sciences.
- Franca R. Barricelli, currently associate dean in the College of Letters and Science at the University of Wisconsin Oshkosh, has been named the next dean of arts and sciences.
- **Becky A. Copper-Glenz**, currently associate provost for Graduate, Continuing Education, Educational Partnerships and Extended Campus at Saint Xavier University in Chicago, was named the next dean of graduate and continuing education.

Throughout the month, Fitchburg Anti-Violence Education (<u>FAVE</u>) will distribute teal ribbons at various locations for individuals to wear and show support for sexual assault awareness.

This spring the university also welcomed Denise Zahui Gboignon to the campus community. She is a sexual violence campus advocate with Pathways for Change Inc., and is embedded on campus through a memorandum of agreement the university and Pathways signed last year as part of its ongoing efforts to foster a safe and supportive community.

"As college students, sexual assault is a major topic on campuses across America, and the women of Alpha Sigma Tau want to support and give a voice to both the women and men that feel as though they cannot speak about it in hopes to end the violence," said Emma Murphy, president of the university's AST chapter.

About 40 members of the chapter will be taking part in the event. Donations to RAINN may be made at the event, or at a table AST will staff in Hammond Hall daily from noon to 2 p.m. or the Holmes Dining Commons from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. through April 5.


Author Putnam to discuss Our Kids Tuesday

Pulitzer winner Rezendes to discuss importance of journalism


Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist Michael Rezendes from the Boston Globe will present "the Power of Journalism in a Perilous Age" next week, part of the Center for Conflict Studies' spring programs.

Rezendes' talk will be given at 3:30 p.m. **Wednesday, April 12** in Randall Lecture Hall in the Antonucci Science Complex, 333 North St. Admission is free and open to the public.

An investigative reporter and political writer, Rezendes was a member of the Boston Globe Spotlight Team for nearly a decade and shared a Pulitzer Prize for investigating the cover-up of

sexual abuse in the Catholic Church. He has probed a wide array of additional topics, including the September 11 attacks, prison suicides, healthcare costs, and the role of money in presidential politics.


Comm Media Lecture Series wraps up year on April 18

Webinar April 25 focuses on master's in middle school ed

The Office of <u>Graduate and Continuing Education</u> will present a free webinar **Tuesday**, **April 25** for visitors to learn more about its new initial licensure programs leading to the Master of Education in Middle School Education, launching in the fall of 2017.

Assistant Professor William G. Cortezia, graduate chair of early childhood, elementary and middle school education programs at Fitchburg State, will lead the 30-minute webinar along with Interim Dean of Graduate and Continuing Education Brian P. Bercier, GCE Advising Services and Support Coordinator Marylyn Gainan and Graduate Admissions Counselor Shelby Cota.

Participants will learn about curriculum, admissions, application requirements and more and will be eligible to have their admission application fee waived.

The webinar will be offered at 5 p.m. Tuesday, April 25.

Fitchburg State's new Middle School M.Ed. will offer four initial licensure concentrations: English, history, mathematics and general science. It will be available as an online hybrid, low-residency format, and the MAT or GRE tests are not required for admission.

"The new middle school program will provide the candidate with a better understanding of what the needs are for the pre-adolescent in their academic and social development, as well as the individualized concentration," Cortezia said.

In the Hammond Hall Art Gallery: ARTeries, through April 12


ARTeries, the university's biannual exhibition showcasing the strongest original student work in drawing, painting, sculpture, and mixed-media art, is on display in the Hammond Hall Art Gallery through Wednesday, April 12. Student submissions to the show were reviewed by a faculty jury for acceptance.

On the Conlon Hall Media Wall: Dave Fischer, On Copper Wings

The abstract video art of Dave Fischer will be on display at the Conlon Hall Media Wall through Wednesday, April 19. By popular demand after the artist's talk on March 29, there will be another wall talk with the artist at 3:30 p.m. **Wednesday, April 12** with a reception to follow.

"On Copper Wings" is described as a film made by insects. No individual insects are listed in association with it - it is thought that hundreds of millions of insects worked on this production. The movie tells the story of the insect creation myth, which involves the insect development of science and technology, insects time traveling to 450 million years ago to rescue the early protoinsects from the Ordovician-Silurian extinction event, and genetically modifying them to be more competitive.

Dave Fischer is an artist from Providence, Rhode Island. He creates videos using a combination of algorithmically processed video, still photographs,



and pure geometry. He writes all his own software for manipulating and editing video, and maintains a cluster of high-end late-90's servers for running the batch-mode computations.

Faculty notes

Kisha G. Tracy (English Studies) received the Massachusetts Women in Public Higher Education Professional Development Award in support of a project entitled "Teacher-Photographer: Transforming Perceptions of Cultural Heritage with Image," the first phase of which she presented at Bard College last week.

Daniel Welsh (Biology/Chemistry) is first author on a new paper entitled "Condition-dependent reproductive tactics in male smallmouth bass: evidence of an inconsistent birthdate effect on early growth and age at first reproduction." This article has been accepted for publication into The Journal of Zoology and will be in print in an upcoming issue.

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
