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"I was accused of being the Marathon bomber"

Just days after the Boston Marathon bombing, then 16-year-old Revere High School student Salaheddin Barhoum saw himself and a friend pictured on the front page of the New York Post under the giant heading, "Bag Men," with a headline proclaiming "Feds seek this duo pictured at Boston Marathon."

Barhoum is now a student at Fitchburg State, studying business. He will discuss the case, its repercussions and lessons we can all take from his experience in a presentation at 3:30 p.m. **Thursday, Nov. 5** at Ellis White Lecture Hall in Hammond Hall, 160 Pearl St. Admission is free and open to the public.

Barhoum had moved with his family from Morocco a few years prior to the marathon bombing. He said he had found his adopted community a tolerant and welcoming place. But when his picture was making the rounds of social media even before landing on the front

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of one of the country's largest newspapers, Barhoum felt vilified.

"That day was the worst," he said. "I wanted to go back to Morocco."

Authorities released likenesses of the real bombers later the same day of the New York Post cover, yet Barhoum was already traumatized by the experience. Barhoum and his friend in the photo sued the New York Post, a case that was settled last year under confidential terms. In the months after being falsely identified, Barhoum's grades suffered and he felt himself retreating from his life. In time, he said, he realized he couldn't give in to his negative feelings.

"Just because you're having one obstacle doesn't mean you can stop dreaming," he said. "You have to look beyond it. I want people to have hope and face their fears. I'm a hopeful person."

Center for Italian Culture celebrates 15 years with music, talks

The Center for Italian Culture at Fitchburg State celebrates its 15th year with a host of events in October and November, including a concert celebrating Italian music from the past 100 years - and the 100th birthday of Frank Sinatra.

The celebration, dubbed *Canti e Cantici: Cent' Anni di Musica e Cultura Italiana* (A Hundred Years of Italian Music and Culture), culminates in a free concert at 7 p.m. **Thursday, Nov. 5** at Kent Recital Hall in the Conlon Fine Arts Building, 367 North St.The concert will include rarely performed music by modernists such as Alfredo Casella, Goffredo Petrassi, and Giacinto Scelsi, and the premiere of a short new piece by Professor Michele Caniato for baritone, piano, violin, and horn on a text by Giacomo Leopardi.

The second half of the concert will celebrate the 100th birthday of Frank Sinatra, joining celebrations and exhibits around the country in paying homage to Ol'Blue Eyes and his musical legacy. Sinatra would have loved the stellar singer Dominique Eade, and her equally extraordinary pianist Tim Ray.

The free concert is a designated Music for Food event, in which donations will be collected at the door to benefit local food pantries.



Internship scholarships available

The university has once again received funding designed to increase internship opportunities for

our students. <u>Scholarships</u> are now available for the upcoming academic year. The deadline to apply for the spring is **Friday, Nov. 27** and for the summer is **Friday, April 8**, 2016.

The State University Internship Incentive Program (SUIIP), operated through the university's financial aid office, is funded by the Fitchburg State University Foundation and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. The scholarship is available to current full-time day undergraduate students who are Massachusetts residents, have earned a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.7 and have a valid 2015-2016 FAFSA on file with the Financial Aid Office.

All majors will be considered but priority will be given to STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) and business/finance majors. Scholarships are available for 3-12 credit internships and amounts will range from \$500-\$5,000.

Faculty Notes

Charles Sides (Communications Media), series editor for Baywood's Technical Communications Series, reported the publication of a new volume, The Other Kind of Funnies: Comics in Technical Communication by Han Yu. The book refutes the mainstream American cultural assumption that comics have little to do with technical communication - that the former are entertaining (in a low-brow sense) and juvenile, whereas the latter is practical and serious (to the point of stuffiness). The first of its kind, this book demonstrates the exciting possibilities of using comics in technical communication.

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
