
COVID-19 restrictions explored in Constitution Day talk

A panel discussion on the legal and ethical implications of COVID-19 restrictions will mark our observance of Constitution Day at 12:30 p.m. Friday, Sept. 17 in the main lounge at Hammond Hall.

Masks. Vaccines. Passports. Lockdowns. The pandemic has raised many questions and issues that have constitutional as well as ethical implications. This panel talk, moderated by **Professor Paul Weizer** (Economics, History and Political Science), will include students Miranda Gustin and Benjamin Hill (captains of our moot court team) as well as **Professor Zachary Miner** (Behavioral Sciences) and **Professor David Svolba** (Humanities).

Constitution Day is observed each year on Sept. 17, recognizing the anniversary of the document's signing in 1787.

Center for Professional Studies programming explores workplace bias

The university's Center for Professional Studies continues its series of offerings on equity and social change this October with a course exploring the complexity of culture and bias in the workplace.

The course, Exploring the Complexity of Culture and Bias in the Workplace, will provide employers and employees with engaging opportunities to explore, examine and assess how they identify themselves to the world, how biases and misconceptions



interfere with understanding others around them, and what systems limit diversity, inclusion, and equity.

Grant will support open educational resources for students



Fitchburg State was among a consortium of colleges that was recently awarded more than \$440,000 from the U.S. Department of Education to increase the number of free, open educational resources (OER) that are designed with a diversity, equity and inclusive lens and used in lieu of more expensive traditional textbooks.

"The approach of creating or adapting OER using an equity lens to better serve underrepresented students, is exciting and novel," said **Jacalyn Kremer**, dean of the Amelia V. Gallucci-Cirio Library. "In addition to Fitchburg State faculty receiving training and support for the creation of these culturally-relevant materials, librarians at the university will take the lead in tracking the project's outcomes including its impact on student success."

CenterStage and Cultural Events

The Fitchburg State <u>CenterStage</u> arts and culture series will feature the sculptures, drawings and animations of artist Yuko Oda at the Hammond Hall Art Gallery through Friday, Oct. 8.

The exhibit, entitled "The Heaviness and Lightness of Being," is a retrospective featuring more than a decade of sculptural installations that investigate the coexistence of nature with the synthetic and the human-engineered.

There will be an artist talk and



reception at 3:30 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 22 at the gallery.

Oda describes the respect and awe she feels for nature as inspiration for her work, with those emotions complicated by a realization that humans have indelibly transformed the natural world. The intersection of the natural and the manmade are explored through the artist's sculptural installations, drawings and animations.
