Speakers Series continues with talk on criminal justice reform




Events explore legacy of Italian colonialism in 1930s

Starting this month, the <u>Center for Italian Culture</u> will look at the legacy of Italian <u>colonialism</u>, centered on the invasion of Ethiopia in the 1930s and its resonance across generations and continents.

In October 1935, Italian Army soldiers invaded Ethiopia. The war was fought until February 1937, and is remembered in Ethiopia as the Italian Invasion, and in Italy as the Ethiopian War. Through its series entitled <u>Confronting Italian</u> <u>Colonialism</u>, the CIC invites

A film about the Italian occupation of Ethiopia in 1935 and its unresolved legacy today. Driving this investigation is the story of a recently constructed monument to Rodolfo Graziani, a Fascist general remembered for war crimes committed during the invasion and occupation of Ethiopia, which sparked international protests and brought this chapter of history back to the forefront of public discourse.

The film's primary aim is to offer an unprecedented glance at the controversial memory of the Fascist invasion in Ethiopia. Italy's uncomfortable relationship with its colonial past has been a matter of discussion in academia, but the general public never engaged in a critical discourse on the real events that took place during Mussolini's campaigns in Africa. If Only I Were That Warrior aims to contribute to this conversation by shedding light on the facts of the past and dispelling some of the myths accumulated over decades of revisionism.

programs that will explore history and culture from a variety of perspectives.

At the heart of this exploration will be the acclaimed novel *The Shadow King* by Ethiopian-American author Maaza Mengiste. Faculty members will lead discussion groups centered on the novel, culminating in February with a keynote address by the author.

The programs begin with a film screening and discussion of *If Only I Were That Warrior* at **3:30 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 9** in Ellis White Lecture Hall. The documentary looks at the recent construction of a monument dedicated to Fascist general Rodolfo Graziani, and addresses the unpunished war crimes he and others committed in the name of Mussolini's imperial ambitions.

Following the screening, at 5 p.m., there will be a virtual question and answer session with director/producer Valerio Ciriaci and cinematographer/producer Isaak Liptzin, who will discuss the making of the film and the questions it raises about the malleable nature of history.

Assistant Professor Kevin McCarthy (Communications Media) will introduce the screening and lead the Q&A with the filmmakers.

the Great Smoky Mountain National Park, Vermont Studio Center, and the Plumbing Museum. Houle is a grant recipient from the Puffin Foundation, Massachusetts Cultural Council, Cornell Council for the Arts, Einaudi Foundation, and John Hartell Graduate Award for Art and Architecture.

Houle currently teaches at Fitchburg State, UMass Lowell and Montserrat College of Art. She received a Bachelor of Fine Arts from Massachusetts College of Art and a Master of Fine Arts from Cornell University.
