
The programs are a prelude to our annual celebration of <u>Black History Month</u>.

The university's Future

wellness in the classroom and

cardiopulmonary resuscitation
(CPR) to adults and infants.

The academy is designed to address ongoing demographic shifts by recruiting and training



future educators from traditionally underrepresented populations. According to the state Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, about 40% of the state's public school students are of color, but only 10% of their teachers come from minority groups, noted Lourdes Ramirez, coordinator of field placements, partnerships and recruitment for Fitchburg State's School of Education.

Sustainability Snapshot

The university's <u>Sustainability</u> <u>Committee</u>, including faculty, staff, and administrators, will be sharing occasional facts and tips in the campus newsletter.

For example, it is estimated that heating and hot water can make up 42 percent of total carbon dioxide emissions in an urban environment in the northeastern United States. However, according to the Department of Energy, a typical home could reduce their carbon dioxide



emissions from heating by 6% (the equivalent of planting 10 trees) simply by lowering their thermostat by 2 degrees during the winter.

Submissions wanted for "Archiving COVID" project

Members of the Economics, History, and Political Science Department and the Fitchburg State Special Collections and Archives announce a project in the construction of an archive of the campus community's experiences of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Photographs and related documents/descriptions that capture an aspect of community members' experiences living and learning during the pandemic may be submitted with this-form. Perhaps it is a photograph of teaching in a socially distanced, masked classroom in Fall 2020. It could be a picture of a remote classroom setup, a modified syllabus from March 2020, or a picture of your mask collection. The goal is to capture the everyday aspects, along with a written description/testimony, of the adaptations, strategies, and realities of the pandemic years, including the recent struggles to confront the Omicron variant.

The goal of this archival project is not only to capture the historical record in the archives, but also to create community conversations, exhibits, and reflections about the tremendous changes we have endured as a community. In the full phase of the project, we will be working with SGA to outreach to students. Students will contribute to the project by conducting oral histories and interviews.
