Women's HERstory Month: "The Hills They've Climbed"



With a series of programs built around the theme "The Hills They've Climbed," Fitchburg State celebrates Women's HERstory Month in March.

The programs begin tomorrow at 3:30 p.m. with an opening reception in the G-Lobby of Hammond Hall. The reception, including a performance by the university choir led by Associate Professor Jonathan Harvey, will feature the unveiling of 12

names of women who have had an impact on Fitchburg State over the years.

The month's keynote address will be offered at 2 p.m. Wednesday, with a virtual presentation by author Loretta Ross entitled "Calling In the Calling Out Culture." Dr. Ross, a self-described radical Black feminist, has said people should not be publicly shamed for accidentally making a cultural mistake or for sending a stupid tweet they later regret, instead espousing the importance of engaging in "uncomfortable conversations."

Following Ross's address, she will lead a <u>workshop</u> on inclusive excellence at **3 p.m**. **Wednesday**. <u>Advance registration</u> is required to take part in the workshop.

Law enforcement focus of career fair on March 1

Mindfulness in policing is focus for visiting CJ professor

Edward Denmark '98 had a long and distinguished career in law enforcement, including 18 years as chief of police in the town of Harvard. But rather than transition to a quiet retirement, he is only ramping up his efforts to help transform a system he sees as in need of repair.



Last fall, Denmark joined the university <u>Behavioral Sciences</u> <u>Department</u> as a visiting faculty member.

Denmark sees Fitchburg State's police program as a model for the profession, linking theory and practice. "There's so much going on in society right now, and policing is right in the middle of it," he said. "There's a cry internally in policing for some kind of change. We need to close that 'trust gap.' That keeps my fires burning."


