Internship: The Learning Experience (daycare/preschool)

During my internship I worked with children ages ranging from 3 months to 9 years. I learned how to manage a whole day schedule involving a calendar, small groups, centers, arts, mathematics, reading, gross motor skill and social skills. I also learned how to



teach during COVID while having students from kindergarten to third grade in my classroom on their computers completing their school work. I would have to manage 6 different remote schedules and make sure students were

getting on to Zoom meetings at the right time, making sure they were completing assignments when needed and support them to the best of my ability.

Career Management:

Able to navigate and explore job options, understands and can take the steps necessary to pursue opportunities, and understands how to self-advocate for opportunities in the workplace.

Global/Intercultural Fluency:

Value, respect, and learn from diverse cultures, races, ages, genders, abilities, sexual orientations, and religions. The individual demonstrates openness, inclusiveness, sensitivity, and the ability to interact respectfully with all people and understand individuals' differences.

Learning and Development:

Develop knowledge of social, emotional, physical, and cognitive development in children through adulthood. Demonstrate knowledge of teaching practices and learning theories.
