Observing Constitution Day

Fitchburg State will celebrate Constitution Day with an address on free speech today at 3:30 p.m. in the main lounge at Hammond Hall.

"Regulating Speech Online: Free Speech Values in Constitutional Frames" will be presented by Northeastern University Associate Professor Claudia E. Haupt. Dr. Haupt will discuss the constitutional issues at stake with online speech regulation and protection. The presentation is sponsored by the General Education Program.

In addition, the campus quadrangle will be the setting for an open session of the university's public speaking class, with students practicing their skills at 11 a.m.

The <u>Center for Faculty Scholarship</u> will present a series of <u>events</u> this fall showcasing research of faculty members. Programming will also incorporate student work.


Upcoming events include the faculty speaker series and a faculty research poster session at 2 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 6 in the main lounge of Hammond Hall.

Professor Charles Sides (Communications Media) recently published two poems in the journal, Appalachia Bare: "Valoury Delia" and "Appalachia Song," which included a Cherokee translation by Loretta J. Slade, first language speaker, Cherokee Nation.

Associate Professor Katharine Covino (English Studies) co-authored *You Got a Phone!* (Now Read This Book), which was published this summer by Free Spirit Press. The illustrated volume was designed to be light, accessible and funny, with <u>information</u> on texting, taking and sharing pictures, online privacy, and maintaining healthy screen habits.

Associate Professor Kisha Tracy (English Studies) authored the book *Why Study the Middle Ages?* (Arc Humanities Press). The <u>book</u> is designed as an introductory guide that gathers and organizes information, current events and scholarship for non-specialists, including undergraduate students.

Associate Professor Daniel Welsh (Biology & Chemistry) presented his research at the Ecological Society of America's annual conference. His presentation, entitled "A big problem? Assessing microplastic abundance in freshwater streams and fish" quantified microplastic pollution in the local north central Massachusetts watershed. This research was done in conjunction with Professor Elizabeth Gordon (Earth and Geographic Sciences) and four undergraduate students at Fitchburg State.

Professor Emeritus James G. Colbert (Humanities) sends word that Brill has published a translation *The Dialectic of the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius of Loyola* by Gaston Fessard, S.J., Dr. Colbert did this translation with the late Oliva Blanchette of Boston College. Also published in late 2021, this time by St. Augustine's Press, was Dr. Colbert's translation of *The Tribulations of Sophia*.

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
