Fitchburg State is launching a new bachelor's degree in <u>digital media</u> <u>innovation</u>, preparing students for employment in continually evolving and intersecting fields including media/journalism, social media and content development.

The new, STEM-designated program recently received final approval from the state Board of Higher Education.



The 33-credit major will explore digital media and how digital technology and computing are changing social and cultural systems in employment markets as new tools reshape industries across the globe.

Almost from the day that Roe v. Wade was decided, it has been under constant attack. This year, almost 50 years later, Roe finally fell, increasing the number of and pace with which states were passing total or near total abortion bans. So, how did we get here? What does this mean for the future of other constitutional rights? What does that mean for pregnant people or people with the capacity to become pregnant?



Born a Crime is the story of a mischievous young boy who grows into a restless young man as he struggles to find himself in a world where he was never supposed to exist. It is also the story of that young man's relationship with his fearless, rebellious, and fervently religious mother—his teammate, a woman determined to save her son from the cycle of poverty, violence, and abuse that would ultimately threaten her own life.

R.A. Salvatore '81, '91 discusses "the future of storytelling"

Best-selling author and twotime Fitchburg State alumnus R.A. Salvatore returned to campus for a day-long residency that included addresses to student groups and a public audience on the topic of "The Future of Storytelling."

Salvatore talked about the expanding media footprint of storytelling. With 20 million books

sold since he was first published in the 1980s, Salvatore now plies his trade across media platforms, including graphic novels and games.

His newest book, *The Dao of Drizzt,* is a collection of journal entries written in the character of Salvatore's most popular creation, the dark elf Drizzt Do'Urden.
