

Staff members receive training in "mental health first aid"

To further the university's efforts to provide real-time mental health support to students, 16 administrators and staff members from across campus participated in an intensive three-day training last week to become certified Mental Health First Aid instructors.



Assistant Dean Robert Hynes, director of the university's Counseling Services, said

Mental Health First Aid is an international, evidence-based program that aims to raise awareness regarding mental health challenges, and provide individuals with basic tools to identify signs of mental illnesses and substance use disorders and provide appropriate support.

"With this new capacity that has been established, we hope to roll out the curriculum to a wide cross-section of Fitchburg State faculty, staff, and student body," Hynes said.

"The hope in bringing Mental Health First Aid to our campus is to bolster our community's shared efforts to address and effectively support the various mental health needs of our students," said **Amanda Sapienza**, assistant director of Counseling Services.

The training was made possible through a mental health grant that Fitchburg State recently received from the Massachusetts Department of Higher Education.

NECHE accreditation renewed through 2032

In December, the New England Commission of Higher Education (NECHE) sent formal notification that the university's accreditation was being renewed, with its next comprehensive evaluation scheduled for 2032.

"With its devoted and talented

faculty and staff, committed Board of Trustees, engaged student body, and visionary leadership, Fitchburg State University is well positioned to prepare 'students to lead, serve, and succeed' well into the future," the commission's renewal letter stated.

Theater project gets federal support

The university's downtown theater restoration project has <u>received</u> \$2 million in federal support thanks to the efforts of the regional congressional delegation.

The funds will go toward the development of a "black box" theater to be



constructed adjacent to the main theater building in the downtown performing arts center. The new construction will be used for university productions and the public, with the restoration of the historic theater to follow in a future phase of construction.

U.S. Rep. Lori Trahan announced the funding as part of a larger \$20.7 million spending package for the Third Congressional District.

Innovation Fund proposals sought for 2023-24

Requests for proposals for the 2023-24 Innovation Fund are still being collected. Proposals will be reviewed for two separate funds, each totaling \$250,000, to support new or continuing projects.

- The <u>Academic Innovation Fund</u> supports faculty and librarians in developing or expanding innovative curricula and/or pedagogy that stimulates enrollment growth and supports student academic success within a framework of equity and inclusion. All full-time faculty and librarians are eligible to apply, as are full- or part-time faculty teaching in the School of Graduate, Online and Continuing Education.
- The <u>University Innovation Fund</u> supports our staff in developing or expanding innovative practices, programs, or services that stimulate enrollment growth, support student retention, and/or promote financial sustainability within a framework of equity and inclusion.

Proposals, due Friday, Feb. 10, should be submitted through the dynamic forms that will soon be shared with the campus community.

New library search tool launches

The <u>Amelia V. Gallucci-</u> <u>Cirio Library</u> has launched

its new integrated library system (ILS), which includes its new cloud-based FalconSearch discovery interface.

<u>FalconSearch</u> will provide a more seamless user experience through a single access point to many of the Library's print and electronic resources including journal articles, books,

newspapers, images, archival material (coming soon), tech lending library, and more.

Some key new features of FalconSearch include:

- Ability to easily save search results and search histories
- · Organize search results into lists
- Virtually browse books on the shelf around records in your search result
- Easily request search and request items beyond the Library's collection via Interlibrary loan (ILL)

Sustainability Snapshot

The Sustainability Advisory
Committee shares the following
information for the campus
community: In 2019 Fitchburg State
consumed 82,483 pounds of paper,
costing \$66,482. Your efforts to
reduce printing can save significant
amounts of energy, paper, and
expensive printer cartridges. Before
printing handouts for meetings or
classes, ask yourself if an electronic
copy would work just as well.



- Always avoid single-sided printing. While most printers are set to print two-sided by default, that might not be the case with StaffPrint (used to be called "Follow-you" printing). You can set StaffPrint to print two-sided under your printing options.
- Faculty printing PowerPoint slides for students: check that you are printing them with at least six slides per page rather than the default of one slide per page.
- Faculty and staff sending print jobs to Print Services may request that their copies come without the shrink wrap, thus reducing their plastic waste.
