This concentration offers a unique approach to criminal justice, proposing that criminal justice activities may be decentralized to involve community in policing, courts, and corrections. It offers students ways to engage community to prevent crime and reduce the harmful consequences of criminal justice-related activities. Learning outcomes include: 1) describing the concepts

and principles of community justice across different aspects of criminal justice, including policing, courts, and corrections; 2) critically examining the aims, operation, and outcomes of community justice approaches; 3) identifying community partners and stakeholders important to community justice; 4) examining examples of community justice approaches both locally and nationally; 5) developing a community justice approach to an existing criminal justice practice; and, 6) effectively communicating knowledge and ideas about community justice using a range of written and data presentation techniques.

Grad students taking this newly-proposed "Community Justice" concentration (30 cr.) of the fully-online MSCJ program will include both current undergraduate students here at Fitchburg State desiring to further their education (e.g., CJ, SOC, HMSV, PSY undergraduate majors, among others), as well as working professionals in the field of criminal justice.

Rationale

Rationale and expected outcomes for new program:

As social justice philosophies and practices become more embedded in the fabric of society and even into the fabric of the overall criminal justice system (albeit more gradually and with some resistance), the CJ Grad Committee firmly believes that offering this new Community Justice concentration provides CJ graduate students with a broader, more wholistic, socially-just approach to crime deterrence and cessation. The three additional required courses for this concentration (see attached) will allow for the integration of such broader community justice philosophies and approaches into the CJ world, thereby eventually moving the "swinging pendulum" of justice to a more socially-just place in society.
