Next week: Undergrad Research Conference and Convocation

The Fitchburg State community will celebrate academic excellence on **Thursday, April 20** with the return of the in-person <u>Undergraduate</u> <u>Conference for Research and Creative Practice</u> followed by the annual honors <u>convocation</u>.

- The research conference, running from 8 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., will take place in Hammond Hall.
- The honors convocation will follow at 2 p.m. in Weston Auditorium. More than 100 awards and scholarships will be presented at that celebration.

The conference has been a virtual event since the start of the pandemic, and this year marks a return to the in-person celebration of student work, from academic research to music and theater showcases.



Governor's visit celebrates Early College

Gov. Maura Healey and Lt. Gov. Kim Driscoll joined other state and local education leaders and students at Fitchburg High School last week to talk about the impact of early college programs, including <u>dual enrollment</u> and <u>Upward Bound</u>.

Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs Pat Marshall joined other university officials at the forum, where students

discussed the life-changing impact that early college programs have had on their paths. (Watch the presentation <u>here</u>.)

The Healey-Driscoll administration has proposed \$14.4 million for Early College and Innovation Pathways for the 2024 budget.

"We decided to come to Fitchburg because Fitchburg is doing it right," Gov. Healey said, describing the collaboration between the high school and education partners including Fitchburg State and Mount Wachusett Community College.

Faculty book launch event Tuesday

The <u>Financial Sustainability Task</u> <u>Force</u>, announced earlier this semester, is continuing to accept campus community input through an anonymous <u>survey</u> available on its website. The survey is open until **Friday**.

The Task Force is developing the first phase of a multi-phased process to propose and develop recommended strategies focused on efficient and effective allocation of resources and new/increased net revenue opportunities.

Celebrating graduate education

The School of Graduate, Online and Continuing Education (<u>SGOCE</u>) held its second annual Graduate Education Celebration on April 3, highlighting the accomplishments of its students and faculty.

The university has more than 3,000 students in graduate classes this semester, being taught by approximately 200 faculty members, according to **SGOCE Dean Becky Copper Glenz**, who presided over the celebration. Of those students, 80% are taking classes entirely online.

Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost Patricia Marshall presented the second annual graduate adjunct faculty award to Dr. Margaret **O'Hearn-Curran**, chair of the <u>dyslexia and reading</u> <u>specialist program</u>.

O'Hearn-Curran's students and colleagues praised her commitment to ensuring all children learn to read and described her as an inspiring, hardworking and dedicated teacher who continues to make an impact on all those lucky enough to study with her, Marshall said.

Admission is free but donations will be accepted at the door. Attendees are advised the play contains graphic depictions of sexual violence.
