

Campus hosts Early College convening

The campus hosted educators and administrators from across Massachusetts on Wednesday, April 12 for a daylong series of discussions and workshops on Early College, a program that lets high school students experience and complete college-level coursework. *(See photos <u>here.)</u>)*

Education Patrick Tutwiler, Department of Elementary and Secondary Education Commissioner Jeffrey C. Riley and Department of Higher Education Commissioner Noe Ortega (who met with students, faculty and administrators as part of his own <u>tour</u> of campus on April 11) cited the success of Early College programs in opening doors of opportunity for students.

President Lapidus opened the event by citing the growth of Early College on the university's campus, with the number of participating students growing by more than 40% in the last year. The university has formal agreements with Mount Wachusett Community College and local high schools including Athol, Fitchburg, Gardner, Leominster, Narragansett Regional, and Sizer School that create credit-bearing opportunities for students.

NEH grant support

The National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) has awarded the university \$500,000 to support the development of the performing arts center on Main Street.

The grant, <u>announced</u> Tuesday, April 18, was awarded by the NEH Challenge Grant program, and will catalyze additional

fundraising efforts by the university.

The NEH grant will support the construction of a 15,830-square-foot "black box" theater adjacent to the historic theater at 717 Main St. in the heart of downtown Fitchburg. The new space will support university students and the community, serving as an applied humanities learning laboratory for students as well as a mechanism to drive downtown revitalization through expanded arts and cultural experiences.

Faculty present on critical literacy at Oxford conference

Associate Professor Katharine Covino (English Studies) and Associate Professor Lyndsey Benharris (Education) recently traveled to England to present at the World Literacy Summit at Oxford University, sharing their research on how

to promote critical literacy for early readers.

The selective conference included just 120 presentations representing educators and researchers from 85 countries, with an in-person and virtual audience that exceeded 45,000 attendees.

The professors are looking to show teachers how they can inspire readers to consider complicated questions about the subjects they are learning.

The faculty members are also co-authors of a new book, *Challenging Bias and Promoting Transformative Education in Public Schooling Through Critical Literacy*, that will be published later this year.

Sustainability Snapshot

The Sustainability Advisory Committee shares the following information for the campus community: Agriculture and our food systems have more impact on the environment than any other human activity, and contribute the largest amount of greenhouse gasses. Because food is so important, two simple strategies can dramatically reduce our footprint. First, cutting down on meat and dairy,

especially red meat, can reduce emissions of greenhouse gasses from food by up to 61%. And a healthier diet is a bonus! Second, 30-40% of the food supply in the US is simply thrown away. The simple act of reducing food waste has a huge environmental benefit (not to mention the money savings benefit.)
