

Celebrating Black History Month

Fitchburg State will highlight African Americans and the arts as the foundation of its Black History Month celebration throughout February.

The <u>programs</u> will culminate in a keynote address by Rhymes with Reason founder Austin Martin.

The programming theme acknowledges the connection between African American art and influence with African, Caribbean, and the Black American lived reality. This theme, organized by the National Association for the Study of African American Life and History, focuses and emphasizes the many ways in which art manifests in our current world whether it be in film, architecture, cooking, and additional forms of expression.

The month will close with a keynote address at **7 p.m. Thursday**, **Feb. 29** by Austin Martin, founder of Rhymes with Reason, in the main lounge of Hammond Hall. Admission to the talk is free and open to the public.

NSF grant will support scholarship, mentorship for STEM students

Fitchburg State University has received a \$1 million grant from the National Science Foundation that will provide scholarship support and mentorship for academically talented students in science, technology, engineering and mathematics.

The grant will build upon Fitchburg

State's pedagogy of "real talk" <u>initiative</u> that is designed to improve retention and career success by fostering deeper connections between students, faculty and staff members. The evidence-based approach is built upon engaging, teaching, and connecting with students at promise, or students who are prone to drop out, combining a focus on the delivery of content with an understanding of the student as a whole human being. The <u>approach</u> seeks to create an inclusive and student-centered learning environment, a classroom climate and culture where students feel safe, known, and valued.

"Through this project, we aim to build institutional capacity for an inclusive and asset-

based pedagogical approach to support domestic, low-income STEM students with academic ability, talent, or potential, and with demonstrated unmet financial need," said **Associate Professor Nirajan Mani** (Engineering Technology), the principal investigator for the grant.



Community Read programs continue this week

The <u>Community Read</u> of alumnus Keith Gentili's book *White Mountains State: A Four-Year Journey Hiking and Summiting New Hampshire's 48 Highest Peaks* continues with a series of events this spring, including a talk by the author himself.

The semester's offerings begin with a <u>virtual</u> <u>talk</u> today at 12:30 p.m. by Professor Michael Hoberman English Studies), who will present "Theodore Seixas Solomons: The Jewish American Who Inspired North America's Most Famous Footpath." The virtual talk is also part of the Speakers Series.

Gentili's book has been described as a down-to-earth story for anyone with an interest in hiking and mountain climbing, highlighting both the trails and challenges of the New Hampshire 48, as well as the deep satisfaction and accomplishment that can result in finishing the list.



The programs continue at 6:30 p.m. Thursday at the Leominster Public Library with "Hiking for the Soul," a screening of a short film and clips ideal for hiking enthusiasts. These materials celebrate the joys, challenges, and life-changing perspectives afforded by hiking in the mountains. After the viewing, Associate Professor Kevin McCarthy (Communications Media) will moderate a discussion on these themes. This program is free and open to the public. No registration required.

New ROTEL volumes published

Professor Kisha Tracy (English Studies), a member of the Remixing Open Textbooks through an Equity Lens (ROTEL) community, recently published two books that promote diversity, equity, and inclusion. Her first book, Heritages of Change: Curatorial Activism and First Year Writing includes principles of writing and information literacy through the lenses of curatorial activism, cultural heritage, and curation/exhibition

Her second book, Why Do I Have to Take This Course? A Guide To General Education helps students systematically study how general education requirements are developed, their history, and post-graduation value. It emphasizes exploration of the significance of individual learning outcomes, especially through the lens of John Lewis' philosophy of "good, necessary trouble."



Fitchburg State is one of six Massachusetts institutions participating in the Remixing Open Textbooks through an Equity Lens (ROTEL) grant. This project provides stipends for faculty to remix and/or develop accessible, intentionally inclusive open textbooks and other OER that reflect students' local and lived experiences.

Faculty Notes

Assistant Professor Sarah Bromberg (Humanities) gave a presentation entitled "Jewish and Christian Exegetical Traditions in Manuscript Illuminations Illustrating Nicholas of Lyra's *Postilla Litteralis*" for a panel at the American Association of Religion Annual Conference in San Antonio, Texas, in November. She also noted the open access publication of her article "The Position of Jewish Art and Exegesis in an Illustrated Christian Biblical Commentary: Ezekiel's Vision of the Tetramorph in Fourteenth- and Fifteenth-Century Manuscripts and Printed Copies of Nicholas of Lyra's *Postilla litteralis*."

Professor Michael Hoberman (English Studies) noted the publication of his <u>article</u> "Jews in the Wilderness" in Tablet magazine. The article describes the role of Theodore Seixas Solomons in the shaping of the nation's best-loved and most spectacular long-distance footpath (who is also the topic of his Speakers Series presentation **today at 12:30** <u>online</u>).

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
