HOW TO USE THE ACTION PLAN

Use the Action Plan timeline to explore potential career paths and plan for success during and after your college experience. The Action Plan provides suggestions and a place to start the conversation with your advisor, but every person and every career journey is unique. Customize your own personal action plan using the **My English Studies Action Plan** tool (next page).

Maximize the time you have in college to prepare for your future. What do you want to do after you graduate with an English Studies degree?

The Action Plan helps you to come up with tentative goals (remember, it's ok if these change as you continue to learn more about yourself and the field!) so you can start working on short-term steps to help you reach those goals or shift directions. Remember, you do not have to do this all on your own, get the support you need from your department and from Student Support Services like **Career Services and Advising (CSA)**.

CORE COMPETENCIES

Reading and Analysis:

Students will be able to extract and construct meaning from textual and non-textual sources.

Critical Thinking:

Obtain information and explore ideas and contexts before accepting or formulating an opinion or conclusion.

Communication and Presentation:

Use the skills and elements of the written word to effectively analyze, contextualize, and argue about texts and ideas both orally and in written form and be able to take and apply critique of their works.

Teamwork:

Students will build the skills to be a valuable colleague and department member.

Literary, Writing, and/or Teaching Knowledge:

Students will demonstrate a mastery of literary history, forms, and culture, writing genres and forms, and/or professional teaching philosophy depending on their concentration.

Career Management:

Students will be able to identify and articulate skills, strengths, knowledge, and experiences relevant to further education and career goals, and identify areas necessary for professional growth.

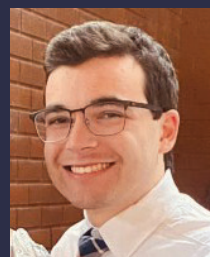

ACHIEVE ACADEMIC MILESTONES

Take classes that interest and challenge you, particularly when selecting your General Education classes, and reflect on how they align with possible future careers
Work with your English Studies advisor to identify key goals during and after your time at FSU

Confirm major choice is right for you
Take gateway courses like Approaches to English Studies, Journalism, Intro to Teaching, and more
Consider a minor to complement and enrich your English Studies interests

Complete required courses like the literature surveys and professional writing core courses
Explore advanced courses in your concentration

Go over remaining degree requirements with your advisor and apply for graduation
Take the English Studies Capstone
Complete an internship, student teaching, or other pre-professional opportunities

BUILD EXPERIENCE

Take a career strength/skills assessment
Consider a part-time job to build your experience
Activate your Handshake account

Apply to summer jobs/internships that will build relevant experience
Connect to English Studies alumni to learn about their internship and career paths
Consider a job on campus as a writing tutor

Pay attention and attend events with employers on campus/career fairs/opportunities to network within your department.
Search and apply to internships in your career field

Develop a list of potential employers and check for recruitment events/open positions throughout the year
Apply to jobs, keep track of and follow up with job applications

JOIN THE CAMPUS COMMUNITY

Join university clubs and organizations in your interest area. Consider the English club or The Point campus newspaper

Attend university and department events and ask questions of alumni and guests
Consider submitting to Route 2 Literary Magazine

Seek out leadership positions in campus clubs/activities
Join Sigma Tau Delta
Seek out opportunities to be a Writing Associate

Consider submitting work to the Fitchburg State Undergraduate Research Conference, the Fitchburg State Creative Writing Showcase

EXPLORE CIVIC & GLOBAL ENGAGEMENT

Explore local agencies and organizations of interest

Talk with your advisor about opportunities to study abroad

Consider volunteering with local agencies like museums/historic sites

Consider participating in a service organization or fellowship after graduation.
Consider submitting work to the Worcester Poetry Competition, the Central Massachusetts Undergraduate Shakespeare Conference, or the American Literature Association

PREPARE FOR LIFE AFTER GRADUATION

Familiarize yourself with CSA workshops and services
Create resume and have it approved by an advisor in CSA Center

Talk to advisor about opportunities within your major for internships/experiential learning
Consider participating in alumni job shadowing or informational interviews with professionals in potential career fields
Begin to collect material for a professional portfolio (if applicable)

Attend a CSA workshop or one-on-one meeting to go over cover letters and interview prep
Update Handshake profile
Create LinkedIn account
Consider graduate schools and decide if it's right for you and your career path

If applicable, take graduate school entrance exams and complete applications
Practice skills by doing at least 2 mock interviews and getting feedback
Finalize a professional portfolio (if applicable)
